
## From The Pastor's Pen

#### Women in History Who Have Changed the World

When we think of women who have made positive contributions to society worldwide, the list is endless. This article highlights only a few of these outstanding people. Some of the people listed here are unfamiliar to many of us, but their achievements are nevertheless noteworthy.



Maya Angelou

From her powerful poetry to her moving autobiography <u>I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings</u>, Angelou forever changed the literary world and opened doors for Black authors everywhere. Her love of books started as a child, when she struggled with selective mutism for five years. Decades later, in 2014, she died at age 86



Lucille Ball

While she was an undeniable light onscreen in *I Love Lucy*, Ball was an extremely powerful figure off camera as well. She was the first woman to own a major studio, called Desilu Productions. She died at age 77 in 1989.



Queen Elizabeth II

Queen Elizabeth II served as head of the <u>royal family</u> for 70 years, making her the longest-reigning monarch in British history. She celebrated her Platinum Jubilee in June 2022, just three months before she passed away at 96 years old.



Amelia Earhart

As the first female pilot to fly across the Atlantic Ocean, Earhart forever changed the world of aviation. Her mysterious disappearance while flying over the Pacific Ocean in 1937 has sparked a range of theories, from a potentially fatal crash to her spending her final days on a remote island.



Michelle Kwan

Kwan dominated the ice throughout the '90s, quickly becoming the most decorated figure skater in American history. She represented both the United States and Asian Americans on the world stage, winning 43 championships and two Olympic medals



Malala Yousafzai

Yousafzai began fighting for girls' rights to education in Pakistan at just 11 years old. After surviving an assassination attempt a few years later, she has courageously continued to be a worldwide voice for young women. In 2014, she became the world's youngest Nobel Peace Prize recipient.



Ruth Bader Ginsburg

Ginsburg made history as the first Jewish woman to be appointed to the Supreme Court. Her entire career was highlighted with pivotal moments in American history. Consistently standing up for gender equality and civil rights, she helped pass historic rulings on topics ranging from the Affordable Care Act to the legalization of same-sex marriage before her 2020 death at age 87.

## *Veda Jeanette Spellman Stroud* April 14, 1916 – November 7, 2021



As the daughter of a Methodist minister and a public school teacher, Veda Jeanette Spellman Stroud ("Aunt Veda") literally grew up "in church and in school." She was born on April 14, 1916, - the fourth child and third daughter of Rev. William T. Spellman and Julia Stevenson Spellman. Her earthly journey was completed on November 7, 2021.

Since Methodist ministers followed the itinerant tradition of John Wesley, Rev. Spellman was assigned to various pastorates throughout the state of Maryland. The family moved often,

but remained steadfast in their strong beliefs in education, artistic development, community and civic involvement, and religious growth. When women were granted the right to vote in 1920, Julia Spellman promptly registered, thus setting an example for her daughters.

As a result of her upbringing, Veda was involved in various activities within the church, starting as a teenage accompanist for church choirs. In the family tradition, upon graduation from Lockerman High School in Denton, Maryland she attended Hampton Institute, now Hampton University, and later transferred to The Agricultural & Technical College of North Carolina, now North Carolina A&T State University, in Greensboro. Thanks to the assistance of a fellow A&T student, Virgil Stroud, Veda survived a hectic registration, and the two became lifelong friends. They were married in 1942, just eleven months after the United States entered World War II following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Virgil had been drafted and was awaiting assignment at the time of their marriage, but he urged her to start working toward her Masters degree while he was away at war. Consequently, she holds a Masters Degree in Business Education from Columbia University. Her involvement as a A&T student included membership in the college choir and accompanist for physical education dance activities. An entrepreneur at heart, Veda put her business and cosmetology skills to work as an unofficial "hairdresser" for fellow female students in need of hair services. In April of 1938, she was initiated into the Alpha Phi Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., and eventually became one of only a few Diamond (75 years+) Sorors worldwide. During those years, she held various positions within the sorority and served faithfully in each. Her first employment after graduation from A&T was as secretary to Dr. Warmoth T. Gibbs, Sr., who was Dean of the College. Following this appointment, Veda taught in the Department of Business for 42 years, retiring as a tenured professor in 1981.

Her membership at St. Matthews United Methodist Church, then located at the corner of Ashe and Lee Streets, began during the first pastorate of the late Rev. J. E. Brower. During the pastorate of Dr. James Ferree she was elected to the position of Secretary to the Administrative Board, a position which she held during the next four administrations. Dr. Walter McKelvey appointed her to a staff charged with the development of the St. Matthews church newsletter to be published monthly for the membership. The Newsletter Committee gradually evolved into the Committee on Communication. She also served on the PPR Committee as well as on scholarship committees. She was honored to have been elected Woman of the Year by the United Methodist Women, also to have been the first recipient of the Annual Pastor's Award for dedicated service to St. Matthews United Methodist Church. True to her family traditions, she was also a member of the Chancel Choir, and a piano accompanist for various ensembles and gatherings.

## Creola Katherine Johnson

August 26, 1918 - February 24, 2020)



Creola Katherine Johnson was an American mathematician whose calculations of orbital mechanics as a NASA employee were critical to the success of the first and subsequent U.S. crewed spaceflights. During her 33-year career at NASA and its predecessor, she earned a reputation for mastering complex manual calculations and helped pioneer the use of computers to perform the tasks. The space agency noted her "historical role as one of the first African-American women to work as a NASA scientist".

Johnson's work included calculating trajectories, launch windows, and emergency return paths for Project Mercury spaceflights, including those for astronauts Alan Shepard, the first American in space, and John Glenn, the first American in orbit, and rendezvous paths for the Apollo Lunar Module and command module on flights to the Moon. Her calculations were also essential to the beginning of the Space Shuttle program, and she worked on plans for a mission to Mars. She was known as a "human computer" for her tremendous mathematical capability and ability to work with space trajectories with such little technology and recognition at the time.

In 2015, President Barack Obama awarded Johnson the Presidential Medal of Freedom. In 2016, she was presented with the Silver Snoopy Award by NASA astronaut Leland D. Melvin and a NASA Group Achievement Award. She was portrayed by Taraji P. Henson as a lead character in the 2016 film Hidden Figures. In 2019, Johnson was awarded the Congressional Gold Medal by the United States Congress. In 2021, she was inducted posthumously into the National Women's Hall of Fame. The film Hidden Figures, released in December 2016, was based on the non-fiction book of the same title by Margot Lee Shetterly, which was published earlier that year. It follows Johnson and other female African-American mathematicians (Mary Jackson and Dorothy Vaughan) who worked at NASA. Taraji P. Henson plays Johnson in the film. Appearing alongside Henson at the 89th Academy Awards, Johnson received a standing ovation from the audience. In an earlier interview, Johnson offered the following comment about the movie: "It was well done. The three leading ladies did an excellent job portraying us. "In a 2016 episode of the NBC series Timeless, titled "Space Race", the mathematician is portrayed by Nadine Ellis.



# **Sojourner Truth**



Sojourner Truth, born Isabella Baumfree, was a female black lay minister for the Methodist church. She was freed from slavery after escaping in 1826; in 1827 she became a Christian and participated in the founding of the Methodist church of Kingston, New York. The year 1843 was a turning point for her. On June 1, Pentecost Sunday, she changed her name to Sojourner Truth. She chose the name because she heard the Spirit of God calling her to preach the truth. She left to make her way traveling and preaching about the abolition of slavery. She delivered many speeches and sermons, the most famous of which was her 1851 address, "Ain't I a woman?" This speech was delivered at the Ohio Women's Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio and addressed having equal human rights for all women. She delivered an address in Boston on the 8th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation in which she admitted that although once hating white people for what they had done to her, and hating her masters, once she found her final master, Jesus, she was filled with love towards all people.

# February Arts in Focus My Arts Story: Andrena Coleman

My involvement in the arts ties together different threads of my life, not unlike the quilts I make.

During my time at Bennett College, I learned how a collection and exhibition are put together. This experience sparked a lasting passion for the arts, laying the foundation for what would become a significant part of my life. About fifteen years ago, I stumbled upon quilting as a means of self-expression and creative exploration. What began as a personal endeavor evolved into a collection of purposeful pieces, ranging from bedcoverings to wall hangings and even reupholstered furniture.





My quilts have found homes in esteemed spaces such as the African American Atelier and the Delta Arts Center. One of the highlights of my artistic journey was the international exhibit, "Conscience of the Human Spirit: The Life of Nelson Mandela," where my work stood among those of a hundred quilters. Another memorable moment was a collaboration with writer James Mayes in the joint exhibition "Sojourn," where his words harmonized with my quilts, creating a captivating blend of story-

telling.

As the owner and designer of Drena's Dream Quintessential Quilts, my studio at Revolution Mill is not just a place to create but a space where art enthusiasts can explore the narratives woven into each piece. My commitment to the arts community extends beyond my studio; I'm actively involved with the African American Atelier and, more recently, accepted the role of a board

member at The Arts Council of Greater Greensboro.





With a background in public health, I bring a unique perspective to the council, bridging the worlds of health and creativity. And within the tapestry of my life, there's a loving family – my daughter Jocelyn, son-in-law Matthew Brown, and four grandchildren – who inspire and remind me daily of the transformative power of art. Through my quilts and service to The Arts Council of Greater Greensboro, I aim to contribute to the vibrant artistic tapestry of Greensboro, enriching the community with stories of resilience, creativity, and connection.


## NATIONAL NUTRITION MONTH

#### Cervical Cancer Awareness Month 2024

March is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month, an ideal chance for WHO and partners to raise awareness of cervical cancer and vaccination against human papillomavirus (HPV), the main cause of cervical cancer. Together, we can strive to end cervical cancer within a few generations. This year, Cervical Cancer Awareness Month aims to highlight the importance of increasing access to HPV vaccines, regular screening, and stateof-the-art treatment for cervical cancer in its early stages. Our shared objective is to dramatically reduce the occurrence of cervical cancer by 2030 and to eliminate the disease as a public health problem by 2120.

When diagnosed early and managed effectively, cervical cancer is one of the most successfully treatable forms of cancer. But caught too late, the outcomes are not nearly as good.

The good news is that cervical cancer can be easily prevented through vaccination against HPV and regular screening. To all girls and women, the messages of Cervical Cancer Awareness Month are clear:

Get informed. Find out the facts about HPV and cervical cancer, including what signs to look out for. Help educate other women in your life too.

**Get screened.** Cervical cancer screening typically starts at 30 years of age and is repeated regularly.

Get vaccinated. The HPV vaccine is given in 1 or 2 doses that should begin when a girl is aged 9–14 years.

#### Know more about cervical cancer



Cervical cancer develops in a woman's cervix, the lower part of the uterus or womb, which opens into the vagina. Virtually all cervical cancer cases (99%) are caused by the human papillomavirus (HPV), an extremely common virus that is spread through skin-to-skin contact.

Most HPV infections are cleared by the immune system and cause no symptoms. But in some cases, infection can persist and lead to cervical cancer developing. Typically, it takes 15-20 years for an infected cervix to de-

velop cancer, but sometimes the process can be faster and take 5-10 years. Cervical cancer can be easily prevented through vaccination against HPV and regular screening. Cervical cancer is the sixth most common cancer in



Mediterranean Region. In 2020, an estimated 89 800 women were diagnosed with cervical cancer in the Region and more than 47 500 women died from the dis-

Early stages of cervical cancer often have no symptoms

When diagnosed early and managed effectively, cervical cancer is one of the most successfully treatable forms of cancer. But caught too late, the outcomes are not nearly as good. Cancers diagnosed at a late stage can be controlled with appropriate treatment and palliative care.

Through prevention, screening and treatment, we can end cervical cancer as a public health problem within a few generations.

#### Know the symptoms of cervical cancer

See a doctor straight away if you experience: irregular bleeding between periods, after the menopause or after sexual intercourse; increased or foul-smelling vaginal discharge; persistent pain in the back, legs or pelvis; weight loss, fatigue and loss of appetite; vaginal discomfort; swelling of legs. Cervical cancer in its early stages may present no symptoms. This is why regular cervical cancer screening is important, even if vaccinated against HPV.

#### Prevention and treatment of cervical cancer



All girls aged 9–14 years should be vaccinated against HPV. This protects against HPV infection, which can lead to the development of cervical cancer and other HPVrelated cancers. HPV vaccines are safe and are given to young girls in a single dose.

Timely screening is es-

sential. If cervical cancer is detected early, it is highly treatable. It is important to have regular screening from the age of 30 years to check for HPV, which can cause cervical cancer. Women who test negative for HPV should get screened again every 5 to 10 years. Women living with HIV should be screened for HPV every 3 years from the 25 years of age. The global strategy promotes a minimum of 2 lifetime screenings, with a high-performance HPV test by 35 years of age and another by 45 years of age.



### News from the Samaritan Garden



Growing season is underway for 2024! On Saturday, February 10<sup>th</sup> the Creation Care Ministry welcomed eleven volunteers to assist with cleaning up the community garden. Students from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, North Carolina A & T State University; along with members of the Greensboro Chapter of Citizens' Climate Lobby came out to support the garden project! Workers filled raised beds with soil, laid mulch, spread pine needles, weeded, and composted. We also hoisted a bird feeder having been donated by Mr. Coley Hooker! Fantastic!

On behalf of the CCM we are working to clear the composting area. Debris from the 2023 season is still outstanding though we hope to be able to produce usable compost from that remaining which will be used to enrich garden soil for growing.

On Saturday, February 17, 2024, Creation Care Ministry members Inell Artis and I prepared three raised beds and planted Yukon Gold Potatoes. We have also seeded cabbage, broccoli, and cauli-

flower starter plants. One goal is to improve Samaritan Garden/community garden operations from year-to-year inclusive of the use of crop rotation strategies and based on the Garden Planting Calendar of Annual Vegetables, Fruits, and Herbs for North Carolina/NC State University Cooperative Extension. A different (first time) variety of onions will number among other cool season growing options. It is anticipated that fewer tomatoes (warm season) will be planted this year (676-678 donated, 2023). Instead, we plan to offer peppers, brussels sprout, green beans, okra, corn, lima beans, cucumbers, and two or more types of squash; together with a scattering of other options (swiss chard, carrots).

Another goal per the 2024 Samaritan Garden is to include native flowering plants as part of our flower selection. **Example:** Baptisia Blue False Indigo (Baptisia australis) Flower and Red Cardinal (Lobelia Cardinalis) Flowers, indigenous to the US/Eastern US/North Carolina. Native plant habitats help preserve biodiversity as part of a collective effort to nurture and sustain the living landscape for birds and other animals.
